2. 'Does Bletchley Park have lessons for today's tech companies?' with Robert Hannigan

Bletchley Park became the home not only of British codebreaking, but the birthplace of modern information technology. Its extraordinary legacy still impacts on us today and resonates through the work of cyber security experts. Join us at this public lecture, given by Robert Hannigan, exploring the link between the work of the code breakers at Bletchley Park and modern tech companies currently working in cyber security.

Robert Hannigan is European Executive Chairman of BlueVoyant, a global cyber security services company. He was Director of GCHQ, the UK's largest intelligence and cyber security agency, from 2014-17, when he left Government after 20 years in national security roles, including Prime Minister's Security Adviser.

4. 'Spy Pilot: Francis Gary Powers'

Hosted by the Institute of World Politics Tuesday 12 March 1521 16th Street Northeast Washington DC, USA

Based on newly available information, the son of famed U-2 pilot Francis Gary Powers presents the facts and dispels misinformation about the Cold War espionage program that turned his father into a Cold War icon. Francis Gary Powers Jr. and acclaimed historian Keith Dunnavant have written this new account of Powers's life based on personal files that had never been previously available.

Delving into old audio tapes, letters his father wrote and received while imprisoned in the Soviet Union, the transcript of his father's debriefing by the CIA, other recently declassified documents about the U-2 program, and interviews with the spy pilot's contemporaries, Powers and Dunnavant set the record straight. The result is a fascinating piece of Cold War history.

6. 'Chinese Espionage and US Security' with Nicholas Eftimiades

Hosted by the Institute of World Politics Wednesday 13 March 1521 16th Street Northeast Washington DC, USA

Mr. Eftimiades will discuss China's espionage scope, operational methods, targets, and the impact on U.S. national security. The discussion presents analysis of over 280 cases of Chinese espionage.

Nicholas Eftimiades is retired from the US Department of Defense. He is currently a professor at Penn State University. His 34 year government career included employment in CIA as a Technical Operations Officer, Special Agent in the US Department of State, Bureau of Diplomatic Security, and a Senior Intelligence Officer in Defense Intelligence Agency.

7. 'An Impeccable Spy – Richard Sorge, Stalin's Master Agent' with Owen Matthews

Hosted by Heffers Bookshop Thursday 14 March 20 Trinity Street Cambridge, UK

Owen Matthews is coming to Heffers to talk about his new book *An Impeccable Spy: Richard Sorge, Stalin's Master Agent.* Drawing on a wealth of declassified Soviet archives and testimonies, Owen brings the story of Richard Sorge, Stalin's master agent, to life.

Owen Matthews read Modern History at the University of Oxford. He has written for

the *Moscow Times*, The *Times*, the *Independent* and the *Spectator*. In 1997, he became a correspondent at *Newsweek*, covering the second Chechen war, Afghanistan, Iraq and the conflict in Eastern Ukraine.

8. 'The Ghosts of Langley: Into the CIA's Heart of Darkness' with John Prados

Hosted by the Institute of World Politics Thursday March 21 1521 16th Street Northeast Washington DC, USA

The Ghosts of Langley is a provocative and panoramic new history of the Central Intelligence Agency that relates the agency's current predicament to its founding and earlier years, telling the story of the agency through the eyes of key figures in CIA history, including some of its most troubling covert actions around the world. Drawing on mountains of newly declassified documents, the celebrated historian of national intelligence John Prados throws fresh light on classic agency operations from Poland to Hungary, from Indonesia to Iran-Contra, and from the Bay of Pigs to Guantánamo Bay.

John Prados is a senior fellow of the National Security Archive, where he directs Documentation Projects on the CIA and on Vietnam. Prados has written thirty books on aspects of intelligence, diplomatic, military and national security.

9. 'Berlin Daze: Tales of a Cold Warrior' with C. Eric Estberg

Hosted by the National Cryptologic Museum Foundation Wednesday 27 March CACI Inc. Maryland Conference Center Annapolis Junction, USA

The NCMF's 2019 Spring Cryptologic Program features Mr. C. Eric Estberg. This presentation will be based on the recently published book, *Berlin Daze*, which recounts dozens of Estberg's adventures and unique experiences over a seven-year period in walled West Berlin, both as an Army NCO, as well as an NSA civilian. As a "Cold Warrior" he served literally on the front lines, separated by only a few miles from hundreds of thousands of Soviet and East German soldiers.

Over the course of a nearly 40-year career at NSA, C. Eric Estberg has held numerous positions, including linguist/reporter, senior policy staff officer, Director's speech writer, Brookings Fellow, chief of staff at the Interagency OPSEC Support Staff, intelligence adviser at NATO Hq in Brussels, and, presently, the country desk officer for a major foreign partner.

10. 'An evening with Dame Stella Rimington'

Hosted by the National Archives UK Friday 5 April Bessant Drive, Richmond London, UK

Known worldwide as the inspiration for Dame Judi Dench's character 'M' in the James Bond films, Dame Stella Rimington is now an iconic face of British espionage. Join us for this very special event at The National Archives, as Dame Stella discusses her life, career and writing.

Dame Stella was appointed head of the Security Service (better known as MI5) in 1992 - the first woman to take the post and the first Director General to have been publicly named in the government's spirit of openness. Having worked in the main fields of MI5 - countersubversion, counter-espionage and counter-terrorism - she went on to successively become Director of all three branches, before retiring in 1996.

11. 'Key Drivers of Strategic Uncertainty: Digital Technologies and Formal Cause' with Milo Jones

Hosted by the Foundation for Security and Strategy Wednesday 6 March Nowy Świat St. 6/12, local "C" ("Świetlica Wolności") Warsaw, Poland

There is a widespread unease in Poland (and beyond) that strategic uncertainty is increasing much more quickly than people expected, and in ways that few people anticipated. The world is changing fast, but exactly how, why and in what direction is unclear. How should people respond? Without a proper diagnosis of the primary cause of strategic uncertainty, leaders in business, government and civil society will struggle both to contain risks and to identify opportunities.

In this talk, Dr. Milo Jones will offer such a diagnosis, arguing that digital technologies are the new formal cause of Poland's strategic environment. In other words, he will explain how digital technologies are structuring choices and reshaping both causes and effects on every level of Polish, European and global society and culture.

12. IAFIE - EUROPE International Conference

14-17 April 2019 Bucharest, Romania

While the practice of intelligence has to adapt to challenges such as transnational threats and the unprecedented expansion of information technology, the academic study of intelligence and the way it is taught in schools are also under constant pressure. What began as practitioner reflection in the CIA's classified journal has now morphed into a large-scale enterprise, involving both practitioners, instructors and traditional social scientists. This determined a contestation of these new forms of knowledge: while practitioners demand that knowledge be for intelligence, academics are intent on creating knowledge about the practice of intelligence. This perpetuates the tug-of-war between the two "tribes" and leads to a series of misunderstandings which need a permanent translation between the "different languages" spoken in the field.
