He formerly hosted a weekly show on Korasan TV focusing on both current affairs and the country's

# 3. 'The Work of the Cold War Military Liaison Missions' with Aden Magee

6 February Online

This presentation addresses two of the little-known, interrelated games of chess involving the U.S. Military Liaison Mission and the Soviet Military Liaison Mission -- both of which operated "behind enemy lines" for over four decades in Cold War Germany. These Military Liaison Missions were unique to the Cold War era, and their operations were among the most fitting microcosms of the battle for Europe which was a vital component of the strategic Cold War landscape.

Aden Magee is a career intelligence and counterintelligence (CI) professional with a legacy of experience supporting U.S. government agencies including the Department of Defense, the Central Intelligence Agency, the Federal Bureau of Investigations, and the Department of Homeland Security. As a CI agent/officer operating in Europe during the final decade of the Cold War, he directed and participated in sensitive CI operations to counter the most sophisticated Soviet bloc intelligence service threats.
