5. 'World War II Homefront: Spies, Saboteurs, and Sympathisers' with Robert Brenner

In honour of George Washington's birthday on February, 20th, 1939, over 20,000 Nazi sympathizers gathered in Madison Square Garden to cheer Adolph Hitler and boo "Franklin Rosenfeld" and the "Jew Deal." This is the untold story of New York City in the run-up to World War II, and the Nazi agents and affiliates that lurked in its shadows. Join historian and New York City tour guide Robert Brenner for a virtual exploration of an unsettling period in the city's past.

6. 'SOE Agent Virginia Hall and the New York Post' with Clare Hubbard-Hall

In August 1941 the Special Operations Executive (SOE) dispatched the American national, Virginia Hall, under the cover identity of a correspondent for the New York Post. During this talk, Claire Hubbard-Hall will examine the complex organisational issues surrounding the maintenance of cover while reporting in areas of conflict and the risk involved.

Dr Claire Hubbard-Hall is a Senior Lecturer in History at Bishop Grosseteste University, where she leads on the Military History programme, and is currently writing a book about women in intelligence, *Miss Moneypenny: The forgotten women of British Intelligence* (Weidenfeld & Nicolson, 2024).

7. 'Anglo-American Clandestine Cooperation' with Thomas Maguire and David Gioe

This event will evaluate what explains the ups, downs, and endurance of the several intelligence partnerships that form part of the Special Relationship. Drawing on original research from the Cold War through to the present day, Tom and Dave emphasise the importance of breaking this intelligence relationship down into its constituent parts when analysing its characteristics and drivers, for not all have looked the same or responded to the same imperatives and influences. This forms part of a wider series organised by the University of Oxford's Centre for the Changing Character of War and King's College London's Defence Studies Department re-evaluating different features of Anglo-American strategic

relations.
